

Do not wash your hands from Democracy, Human Rights and Rule of Law obligations during COVID - 19! The 2020 COVID-19 pandemic has left most of the human population in a state of shock. The pandemic challenged and affected all fundamental rights in Europe and around the globe. European values such as democracy, human rights and rule of law were affected to such an extent that the European Union and the Council of Europe organised the common initiative - Wash your hands and defend human rights: EU and Council of Europe actions in the time of COVID-19. Two leaders from CEC member churches, Bishop Bosse-Huber from Germany and Metropolitan Emmanuel from	In democratic countries in Europe, democracy, human rights and rule of law are business as usual. In times of normality, the right to freedom of religion or belief is taken for granted by the majority of people in Europe. During the pandemic, European governments reacted in various ways by limiting the right to freedom of religion or belief. Some traditions like the Orthodox one, the practice of the 'shared spoon' (a centuries-old practice for the receiving of communion) raised questions on whether communion is source of health or source of disease. In some Protestant traditions, adapting to the new ways of worship has also proven to be a difficult exercise.
